




Estimated daily Sando bag waste generation from different sources in Los Banos in 2014


Estimated daily generation of thin plastic film waste from various sources in Los Banos,2014

Campaign on the use of biodegradable packaging materials and containers















Municipal Ordinance No. 2008-752

 Prohibition on selling and providing customers with plastic bags as packaging materials for dry goods and as secondary packaging materials for wet goods

 Segregate, clean and dry plastic waste and bring to the barangay hall for disposal

Prohibition on disposal of plastic waste

Penalties for violators of the ordinance

- Fist Offense P 500 fine
- Second Offense P 1,000 fine
- Third Offense P 2,500 fine and/or imprisonment of not more than six months upon the discretion of the court and in the case of business establishments, cancellation of business permit for one year

At the households

 Used singles use plastic bags were cleaned, dried and garbage collector pick up dried plastic bags and brought to the MRF for recycling

At the end of his term in 2010, the next Mayor discontinued the program and the equipment was not properly maintained and some were dismantled. When he came back in 2013, none of the equipment could be restored.

2014

 With increasing cost of fuel and used cooking oil, Mayor Perez has been asking DOST to make the used plastic bags brittle for shredding and use in making concrete

MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE NO. 2014-1361 (EXPANDED PLASTIC ORDINANCE)

Prohibition on the use of plastic carry-out bags

 Prohibition on the distribution and use of disposable single use plastic drinking straw

 Prohibition of the use of plastic bags used in making ice for take-out soft drinks, juice, and other beverages

- Regulated use of plastic bags for safety of selected food products
 - a. meat and meat products
 - b. Fish
 - c. Soup or broth-based dishes
 - d. refrigerated produce
 - e. Chopped vegetables
 - f. Chopped fruits
 - g. Rice in the month of July to

December

 All retail establishments shall provide the customers with carry-out paper bags, reused carton boxes or reusable bags at the cashier counter. Customers should be encouraged to bring their own bags and/or containers

 Plastic waste should be cleaned and dried prior to submission to the barangay hall for proper disposal Members of the Task Force
Kalinisan with Mayor written
authorization may enter retail
establishments to inspect their
compliance to this ordinance

PENALTIES

Fines similar to the previous ordinance Los Banos residents who can not afford to pay, community service of 12 hours for every P 500 fine.

Violator can appeal in writing to the Mayor regarding the issuance of citation ticket.













Draft Additional Ordinance on Single Use Plastic Bags

- Ban single use thin plastic bags in the Municipal Offices and activities
- At the barangay 'talipapa' market, regulate the use of single use plastic bags and use paper bags or reusable thick plastic bags
- Provide raffle tickets for costumers who bring reusable containers for wet goods in the two public markets to replace single use plastic bags

Lessons Learned

- Sustainability of implementing of local ordinance on plastic waste depends on the commitment of the succeeding Local Chief Executive. This is due to lack of national law, which DENR and DILG can imposed on the LGUs.
- •Update on existing ordinance on plastic ordinance should indicate that Barangay Government is co-implementator to avoid an excuse that the barangay has not yet adopted it.

 Recycling should free from health risk to the workers and cost effective

 Local government units can play a major role in the circular economy for single use plastic bags, reduction of use of this packaging material at the consumer level and in collection of cleaned and dried plastic bags for processing

Improvement of local governance of single use plastic bags

 The national law on reusable plastic bags should require the manufacturer to print on each bag the name of the manufacturer and thickness of the plastic bags to facilitate the monitoring by the M/C ENROs and barangay environmental enforcers to avoid free riders.
